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Local Government Tradeoffs and Perspectives

- Desire to grow and increase tax base
- Desire to protect people and property
- Minimize risk to public infrastructure and cost of maintenance/rebuilding/construction
- Short-term costs and politics vs. long-term vision, safety, and financial viability

- No duty to provide drainage
 - As with many services (fire, police, etc.), authority or power to provide
 - If provided, duty to maintain



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Maintenance vs. Upgrade

- No duty to upgrade
- Why the difference?
 - For existing, people now depend on it
 - No right to depend on what hasn't been built
 - Separation of gov't powers
 - Need to preserve the discretionary power of the legislative branch



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Maintenance vs. Upgrade

- Immunity through "planning" vs. "operational" distinction
 - Immunity for planning as this is legislative
 - No immunity for "operations;" always a duty to act with reasonable care to avoid harm to others







 Local government has immunity from damage that occurs as a result of a local government's policy decision not to upgrade a drainage system

- Christopherson v. City of Albert Lea, 623 N.W.2d 272, 276 (MN Ct. App.2001)

 Failure to upgrade is a failure of design and construction, for which political subdivisions enjoy immunity, and not a claim based on a failure to properly maintain, for which there may be liability

Coleman v. Portage Cty. Eng'r, 975 N.E.2d 952, 960 (Ohio 2012)





Claims: – Taking – Duty to "maintain" road

5th DCA

- Discretion not absolute
- County must provide "reasonable level of maintenance" that results in "meaningful access"
- How can County fight the ocean?

Capital Improvement Planning

- Capital improvement planning (CIP) is a clear representation of the legislative duty
 - Involves extensive discretion
 - All about planning and making choices balancing different policy considerations
- Integrate limits on infrastructure expansion or rebuild/redesign and creating more clarity on "ministerial/maintence" activities vs.
 "discretionary/planning/legislative" actions

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What Will Become of Our Beaches?

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Vacated and Abandoned Property

 Will anyone really want the "new" waterfront property created by SLR?



Ugly Squatters Illegal activities Pollution



Property Assessed Clean Up and Preservation

• PACUP

- Establish clean up costs on a parcel-by-parcel basis
- Projected timeline to reach full cleanup amount
- Set payment schedule based on info and including safe interest rate calculation
- Administrative costs but less than local gov't liability and coastal mess





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Safest Policy Responses

- Provide "notice" to those in at-risk areas about current and future risk
- Increase design standards based on future scenarios (elevation, drainage)
- CIP acknowledging future increases in costs and decreased revenue
- Public bdg. siting & design
- Public purchase of at-risk properties (fee or easement)

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Moderate Risk Policy Responses

- Increased buffers and setbacks for landowners directly affected by SLR/flooding
- Prohibition of government-financed hard-engineered structures (armoring) in designated SLR zones
 - Large-scale public land acquisition in vulnerable areas and areas nearby financed by new taxes and bond issues followed by resale or rental/lease with restrictions to private owners
 - Zoning Overlays, TDRs, dev. limitations, elevation, downzoning/non-conf. use, set backs, floodplain regs, moratoria



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Riskiest Policy Responses



Riskiest Policy Responses (more)

- Severe restrictions on development/ redevelopment in the most at-risk areas
- Exactions
 - Money, property interest, or waiver/release form for certain types of potential claims
 - Prohibition on hard armoring



Adaptation Tools (More Challenging)

- Planning longer time frames
- Zoning Overlays, TDRs, dev. limitations, elevation, downzoning/non-conf. use, set backs, floodplain regs, moratoria



- Exactions
 - Money, property interest, or waiver/release form for certain types of potential claims
 - Prohibition on hard armoring




Can we do it?

- Drivers and impediments
- Can innovation and creativity overcome the same impediments that have stopped us to date?
